The most immediate benefit of a residential harvesting system is financial.

Free Water: Rainwater is entirely free.

Reduced Demand: Using stored rain for outdoor tasks slashes your municipal water consumption.

Uncontrolled stormwater is a leading cause of costly residential property damage.

Erosion Control: Heavy downpours wash away topsoil, ruin landscaping, and carve deep gullies into lawns.

Foundation Defense: Directing downspouts into collection systems keeps pooling water away from your home's foundation and out of your basement.

Puddle Reduction: Capturing water early prevents standing pools that saturate your yard and create breeding grounds for mosquitoes.

Eased Burden: Urban storm sewers are easily overwhelmed during heavy downpours, leading to street flooding.

Pollution Prevention: Runoff picks up oil, fertilizers, and pet waste from suburban streets, carrying them directly into local rivers. Capturing that water keeps pollutants out of nearby waterways.



Combined Sewer Support: In older cities, capturing rain prevents raw sewage from overflowing into public lakes and streams during major storms.



GETTING STARTED: FROM SIMPLE TO SOPHISTICATED

Implementing a system at home can match any budget or skill level.

Rain Barrels (Beginner): A simple 50-to-100-gallon barrel connected to a gutter downspout. Perfect for hand-watering flower beds.

Rain Gardens (Intermediate): A landscaped depression planted with native, deep-rooted perennials that naturally absorb and filters run off from your roof or driveway.

Cisterns and Pumps (Advanced): Large above ground or underground tanks equipped with pumps. These systems can store thousands of gallons to power automated lawn sprinklers or even flush home toilets.
